

A Path Forward

- March 2023 BOE Approved: COPs Financing Plan will flatten expenditures in FYF and lower levy millage request.
 - Amended Five Year Forecast due to COPs financing option debt rating necessary
 - Includes \$600,000 contingency for all projects
 - Can be utilized for other Permanent Improvement needs should any projects come in under budget
 - Prior to April BOE Regular Meeting
 - March 27 Board Work Session to discuss priorities and how this impacts millage
 - Including additional efficiencies being discussed with Admin Team
- April 2023 BOE Regular Meeting
 - Resolution of Necessity to initiate levy process for November 2023 ballot



Additional Items Under Discussion (from February Board Meeting)



Value Engineering efforts are still ongoing with all projects in the district



We are actively seeking naming rights for the Athletic facility. These proceeds would go towards loan payments and reduce future GF expenditures.



We continue to identify cost saving measures, that we will bring to the BOE at our upcoming work session for consideration



Ask: Find Efficiencies to Further Reduce Millage



Through a new financing structure and additional efficiencies for the next school year, Millage has been lowered by 21% and Cost/\$100,000 property by 18%



What Cost Efficiencies Were Identified?

Guiding Principles:

- No impact to current student programs (ex: Gifted, AP, College/Career, Art/Music/PE)
- No impact to current student supports (ex: Transportation, Mental Health Services)
- Follow same process used each year to identify staffing efficiencies and to review the efficacy of contracted services

Milford Has a Strong Performance Index


The Performance Index measures the achievement of every student, not just whether or not they reach "proficient." Districts and schools receive points for every student's level of achievement. The higher the student's level, the more points the school earns toward its index.




No District Spends Less and Achieves More





Expenditures are Driven by People and Contracted Services



- Our largest single contract is transportation - \$7.2M
- Teachers and staff are approximately 72% of the Milford Schools budget
- Despite significant increases in benefit costs, ongoing efficiency reviews are keeping the total % of salaries and benefits flat over 5-years



Options to Reduce Millage: Low/Medium Classroom/Student Impact

Eliminate specialty classes (examples: AP, Electives, 8th Grade Credit Granting, Gifted, 6th Grade Band/Choir)	Budget Impact: TBD Classroom Impact: High Parent Impact: High	TBD	 Elimination of AP and Electives Eliminate 8th grade credit granting courses for Jr. High Elimination of Gifted Services Elimination of 6th Grade Band/Choir
